Melanie is a Dallas-area-based licensed clinician, and well-known authority on transracial adoption who herself was adopted from Korea. She will be leading the "Adoption Journeys" component of this year's Chinese Culture Camp. During the workshops, Melanie will be assisted by adoptee and longtime FCC member Genevieve Norman.

## Workshop Goals

- To gain a better understanding of what adoption means in an adoptee's own words
- Identify the people and roles involved in the adoption process
- To understand that we can learn from others who have experienced something similar, but that every experience is a little bit different
- To feel safe to express ALL feelings.

## Workshop Topics

#### **Parents**

- 1) Attachment 101: More than a pop-term. Over the years, adoptive parents have learned about the importance of attachment. We will examine the historical underpinnings of attachment, why it remains prolific, and redefining what attachment is and is not.
- 2) Parental Attachment Patterns and How These Impact Our Children. As a parent, do you ever find yourself doing things that you never vowed you would do (ex.: the déjà vu effect—doing what your parents did)? Did you know that our attachment patterns are behind these actions? Come explore different adult attachment patterns, what that says about how we, as adults relate, and how these impact our children's attachment. Learn some basic strategies to better maximize a secure attachment pattern between you and your child.

# 7-11 and 12-14 Age Groups "Adoption: In My Own Words"

Learning to put our adoption story into our own words is a powerful way to understand where we have been and help us plan where we want to go. Come explore the many ways you can share your adoption journey.

Each attendee will explore their adoption story through art and play. We will explore what adoption is, discuss the different roles that people have played in their lives before and after adoption (birth family, orphanage caregivers, foster families, siblings), and how adoptees may describe adoption. Through the use of art, storytelling, music, and play, they will explore their adoption narrative in their own words. This allows adoptees a sense of mastery and empowerment over their own journey—giving them the opportunity to better organize and understand their experience with others who have experienced something similar.

## 15-18 Age Group

### "The Skin That I'm In"

International, transracial adoptees face unique challenges as they move into young adulthood. Issues such as racism, stereotypes, and learning how to bridge two cultures together are a normal and healthy portion of an adoptee's development and identity. Understanding how these issues impact young people individually can be helpful when they can address others who are experiencing something similar. We will discover through open dialogue and the integration of art—mask making and collage.
